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A commitment to continued improvement, quality management practices, and a love for breeding beef cattle makes B&B Simmental a small, but powerful producer of seedstock. Betsy Senter and Bonnie Noziska both took unique paths to South Dakota, and each were driven to the farm by a passion for agriculture. For over 20 years, they have used a well-rounded approach to developing bulls that are ready to thrive for commercial producers.

Building a Business

"We're keeping an eye on what the customer wants," Senter explains, "Some people are skeptical of Simmental in this area because it's not widely used. So, what we're trying to do is keep that half to three-quarter type bull that will give them a calf that's at least a quarter to half Simmental. That gives them some comfort, in dealing with a breed they're not familiar with. Pretty soon they come back and say they're not worried about calving ease and that they can see what the breed does."

Senter first got into the cattle business when she moved to South Dakota with the USDA, after growing up and attending college in North Carolina. She worked in several towns in South Dakota, before settling in Burke. Living in town eventually drove her to find a farm to rent, and soon she was in the cattle business. Along the way, Senter acquired more cows, rented more land, met Noziska, who is from New Hampshire by way of California, and the two were able to join their resources and purchase more farmland.

After 32 years working for the USDA in the Farmers Home Administration as a Farm Loan Manager, Senter retired and jumped full-time into raising Simmental cattle. Noziska was right there with her, ready to commit her energy to the seedstock business. The herd was originally commercial, but after a conversation with a neighbor and other considerations, Simmental was brought into the program with a three-quarter blood J&C Black Maximizer son from John Volk and Sons in Battle Creek, Nebraska. "We bought our first three-quarter Simmental bull in 1997 and started breeding and keeping heifers back" Senter recalls. "We were really interested in developing our females. We purchased some Angus cows that were young cows through the sale barn, and we really haven't purchased anything since then."

At the root of this decision was a desire to improve docility and take advantage of Simmental's maternal power. "We were impressed with the growth, docility, and maternal qualities of the Simmental breed," Senter recalls.

The quality of their cattle improved dramatically, and with the encouragement of friends, family and neighbors, they started keeping back replacement females, started registering animals, and quit castrating their top bull calves.

Quality Over Quantity

Today, B&B Simmental runs around 80 cows, selling an average of 15 bulls per year. Like many in the beef industry, limited resources guide the structure of the program. Land is expensive, as is labor, and with their current self-sustaining program, expansion doesn't necessarily make sense. With that, they have chosen to focus on quality over quantity. "We know we can't do volume — we're limited with land resources — so we decided to put our money into quality," Senter says.

With that scale in mind, B&B Simmental is able to dedicate more attention to detail and is committed to making sure the herd is constantly improving and that each customer is happy with their purchase. All bulls are fed and developed at the farm with a focus on making sure each animal is getting the best nutrition possible without becoming too fat.

Senter has always been inclined to place value in data and numbers, and upon becoming involved with Simmental, she immediately became familiar with the available tools. A trip to Chappell Feedlot and conversations with Tom Williams peaked Senter's interest in data collection even more. "The part that interested me was that they were doing carcass ultrasound to see if cattle were ready to be harvested," Senter Recalls. "Williams told me, 'The science is there, you just have to trust it'".

Marrying the principles of science with the no-nonsense needs of the customer are at the core of the B&B Simmental program. "I think the \$API is really helpful to a lot of bull buyers. It gives them something to hang their hat on and not be worried about," Senter explains.

DNA testing is also a tool B&B Simmental uses to validate both parentage reporting and enhance EPDs. Senter wants to know that customers can trust both the pedigree and numbers behind each bull. "I DNA test all of my bulls, even though it's expensive. I do the uLD (ultra-low density) on all of my yearling bulls we plan to sell."

B&B Simmental also participated in the Cow Herd DNA Roundup with the goal of furthering the strength of the data backing their herd. Maternal traits have always been a focus, but recently, Senter has made it a goal to begin marketing females. This year, they bred 30 heifers, which is more than normal, and have been getting ultrasound carcass data on all of the young females, in addition to pelvic measurements. "If you're going to do all of the testing on your cows, it doesn't really make sense to sell all the heifers at the sale barn," Senter says.

One of the challenges of running a small operation is the risk involved with trying unproven AI sires. The success of B&B Simmental has relied heavily on the predictability of data-backed bulls. "When they have 80-90% accuracy, we can have confidence in that," she says. "With using those proven high-accuracy sires, I have seen our EPDs change in our cows. Our younger cows are so much better than the older cows. You can see that their calving ease, or yearling numbers, have improved and you can see it in the cattle themselves."

Running a small operation also comes with some distinct advantages, one being customer interaction. All of B&B Simmental's bulls are sold private treaty, and many of their buyers place value in being able to spend time looking at the cattle and discussing their purchase. "There are a lot of people who still like to go out and do things one-on-one. They like the personal touch," Senter explains.

Noziska and Senter own and operate B&B Simmental and are responsible for everything from breeding decisions to daily work and farming. They both take great pride in their cow herd and the business they have built.

Community is at the Core

Community is central to Senter and Noziska, and plays a number of roles in their operation. Neighbors are always eager to help Senter if she has equipment questions during haying season — she puts up all of the hay required to feed the B&B cows through the winter — and in general, the community is there to help out with cow work and whatever is needed. Noziska's granddaughter also comes every weekend during calving season to help with the work and night shifts. "We have a good support group in our neighborhood," Senter says.

Both are members of a local CattleWomen's group — the Rosebud Rancherettes — and the active group has recently helped put local beef in the Burke school. Senter helped manage the processing and delivery of the first three animals, and they recently delivered a new batch of locally-grown beef for the kids to eat at lunch. Senter explains, "We're one of the few schools in South Dakota feeding the kids local beef. We're really promoting local food in that way."

Senter also served as an advisor when agricultural and vocationally-focused classes were added to the course options for Burke students. At the ranch, a local family — also breeders of Simmental — helps out during the summer. Ages 16, 15, and 10, the kids are a helpful and an enjoyable part of the B&B operation.

Both Senter and Noziska are quick to emphasize how much they enjoy the challenges and successes that come with raising cattle on the South Dakota plains. Simmental have been an irreplaceable piece of their success. "I think it's a great life," Noziska concluded. "It's a lot of hard work, but it's really satisfying."

The "Why" Behind Whole Herd Reporting

The American Simmental Association (ASA) launched the whole herd reporting system called, Total Herd Enrollment (THE), in April of 1999. Twenty years later, THE remains at the center of thorough data reporting to fuel the genetic evaluation. Why is whole herd reporting so beneficial to genetic evaluations and beef cattle breeders? This article dives into the merits of THE and similar systems for data-driven seedstock breeders and producers.

There are three big benefits of whole herd reporting for breeders.

1. To collect fertility and convenience trait data on the cow herd.

Reproduction is the biggest driver of profitability in the cow-calf sector and is also lowly heritable. Being lowly heritable means reproductive phenotypes are largely due to environmental influences. Therefore, to make improvements in the genetics of reproductive traits, it is imperative to use EPDs rather than making decisions based on a phenotype (i.e., pregnant vs. open). That is not to say there aren't managerial reasons to cull an open cow, but culling because of a pregnancy status will not improve the genetics of fertility.

Cow longevity records encompass both reproductive and convenience traits into one record system — whether the cow had a calf every year (and therefore stayed in the herd). If a cow is removed from the herd, breeders have to give a reason for culling that encompasses fertility but also other structural or convenience traits.

THE herds report productivity for every single cow in the herd which indirectly provides fertility data on the entire herd. Records from THE herds are crucial for accurate prediction of Stayability (the likelihood that an animal's daughter will remain productive in the herd up to 6 years of age). Cow longevity is a big driver of economic value to the cow-calf sector making the accurate prediction of stayability a vital component to the success of commercial cattle operations.

2. Better prediction of all remaining production traits.

By reporting records on whole contemporary groups, not just the best calves or calves that will be registered, breeders provide a much more complete picture of the genetic potential in those animals on all the traits they are recording. This benefits the herd reporting the data

with more accurate within-herd selection information (for example ratios, see table). It also makes the EPDs in the IGS Multi-breed Genetic Evaluation



more accurate as it better depicts the true genetic merit of the herd and the bloodlines represented within it (see tables on opposite page).

Here is an example from previous ASA staff articles where the consequences of reporting only part of a contemporary group and the resulting within-herd ratios, ranking, and EPDs were discussed.

Scenario: Using actual numbers from our database on spring 2015-born calves, we started with a set of 12 bull calves that are contemporaries from birth. Two of the calves were culled prior to weaning. The rest of the calves had birth, weaning and yearling weights submitted. Therefore, we have complete reporting on this contemporary group.

To show what happens with incomplete reporting, the weaning and yearling weights were removed on the four calves with the lowest adjusted growth measurements and we recalculated the group's ranks, ratios, and EPDs. This would be comparable to a breeder not weighing (or submitting) data on their bottom-end bulls. The tables included show the results of performance calculations with the complete contemporary group (in white) and with incomplete reporting (in gray) and similar EPD and indexes when incomplete data is reported.

When partial data is reported, the moral of the story is clear — the best calves do not get credit for being as good as they are (incidentally, their parents won't either.) Take a look at the 16C bull that scored a 118 ratio at weaning with a complete dataset. Its ratio went down to 110 and its WW EPD dropped from 53.8 to 49.1 when the slower-growing bulls were removed. 16C also experienced dips in its YW, \$API and \$TI. The same pattern exists for the other top bulls. Alternatively, the bottom bulls improved when their growth data were not included. By not reporting their growth data the system does not know how poorly they performed and can only use their birth weights and pedigrees to make growth predictions.

3. Higher return on the breeder's time and money.

By enrolling in THE, many breeders receive a kickback on prices for data, EPDs, and certificates with varying fee structures based on the needs of each operation. The real financial benefit comes from better predictions of the genetics in the herd and across the population. People pay a significant amount of money in genomic testing to try to get more accurate predictions of their cattle. High-quality phenotypes are just as valuable in genetic predictions. Consider all the time and money that has gone into raising a calf to weaning — this starts long before a calf is born. Selecting the parents, choosing the matings, synchronizing and breeding, turning out bulls, managing everyone for health, proper nutrition, calving, individual identification, taking weights, calving ease scores, making sure the calf and its dam receive all the care they need to flourish. There is work, time, and money invested in all this plus getting the records, submitting the records to

your breed association, all the work that goes into the genetic evaluation. Given all this effort and expense, programs like THE ensure the breeders get the most value out of their hard-earned herd measurements.

THE requires breeders to keep a current inventory of cows in the herd and a status or production code for every cow. THE isn't a fit for every seedstock operation which is okay. If for various reasons, THE doesn't fit your operation, strive to submit whole contemporary group data whenever possible.

The foundation of accurate genetic evaluation is high-quality data to fuel the predictions. Thanks to all the data-focused breeders committed to the genetic improvement of their cattle in programs like THE. High-quality data helps the entire population have more accurate genetic predictions. •

Learning, Leading and Cattle Feeding

ASA's Steer Profitability Competition bridges the gap from making herd genetic selection decisions to sending calves to slaughter

From ranch to rail, understanding the larger picture of how each section of the beef cattle industry interrelates can be difficult. The American Simmental Association (ASA) has the solution — a youth competition that provides a hands-on platform for juniors to integrate their knowledge into real-world scenarios, dubbed the Steer Profitability Competition (SPC).

Partnering with the University of Missouri (MU), the ASA provides junior members the opportunity to select an individual steer or pens of three steers to feed out at MU's Beef Research and Teaching Farm in Columbia, MO. The juniors receive monthly newsletters, feedlot data, and participate in educational webinars.

"We are providing youth in the beef industry the opportunity to experience the challenges, difficulties, and opportunities associated with cattle feeding, which most beef producers, especially at the cow-calf level, don't often receive," says Chip Kemp, ASA Director of Commercial and Industry Operations.

Kemp acts as liaison between ASA and MU, and handles the steer relocation logistics. He says, "Each year, we see a serious level of animal husbandry that the university puts into the cattle. Also, the data and information coming from a research-based facility has been great for the juniors who participate."

Calves are placed in small pens ranging from three to five head when they arrive at MU. They are vaccinated, provided an EID tag, and a DNA sample is taken. In addition to the pedigree and performance data on this animal, the animal is genotyped in ASA's genetic evaluation.

"The overall quality of the cattle that have been sent has been excellent," shares Kenneth Ladyman, MU Beef Farm Manager. Ladyman, a pivotal part of the success of the SPC, is responsible for handling and feeding the cattle.

"We give the calves a week-long acclimation period where MU staff work hard on keeping a close eye on the calves. They get a ration in front of them that is low key, good for their gut," Kemp shares, "When we start to test the calves, they stay in the same pen that they started in from day one, with the same group of calves through the entire process."

GrowSafe Systems[®] track each animal's feed intake, monthly weights, and aids in billing out specific expenses per head.

"It is important for young people to see that not all cattle are the same. They grow at different rates and consume different amounts of feed at different times," says Ladyman. Each month, participants receive 13 different metrics to determine how each calf is performing from a gain, health, and cost standpoint. He continues, "With the GrowSafe data, these youth have the opportunity to see how their calf performed every day on feed, and get monthly weights to see how they are gaining. With the individual billing they have the opportunity to see exactly how much it cost to feed out cattle, and how much feed it actually takes to finish one."

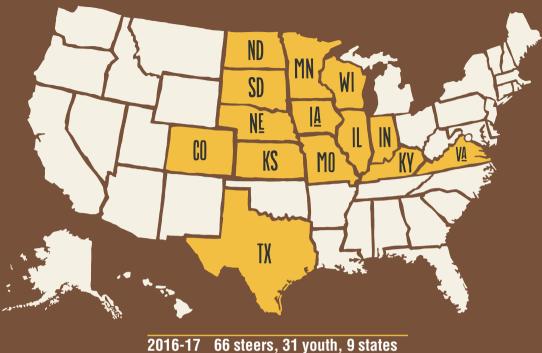
In addition to feeding out steers, juniors participate in educational webinars and monthly feedback assignments. Each year speakers vary from ASA staff, to extension or university personnel, to people working in cattle feeding. "The folks who speak in our webinars bring a wealth of knowledge on a whole range of topics that would be difficult for a junior to receive on a regular basis otherwise," says Kemp.

Industry-leading speakers address a wide range of topics, including learning how individual feed intake of their steers is measured using GrowSafe technology, an overview of animal breeding and genetic selection, and discussing the harvest process and carcass grading.

For example, in 2019, Dustin Puhrmann, Beef Production Specialist with Cooperative Farmers Elevator in Iowa, gave a presentation on identifying, managing, and market-

ing feedlot cattle. The year before that, Dr. Brandi Karisch, Mississippi State University, presented on feeder calf health.

Juniors submit feedback assignments for each webinar, and the participant in each age division with the highest total score on assignments wins a prize. This year, participants tried new assignments developed by the ASA staff, such as calculating the initial value of their steers based on the USDA feeder calf prices for the week their steer was delivered to the feedlot and creating their own selection index by picking the three most important traits for their operation and three more traits that would matter in their area.

"I was extremely impressed with the grasp the SPC kids have on the impact of their local environment on cattle production. I read about fescue tolerance from Missourians, brisket disease resistance from Coloradans, and how calving ease was important because it was pretty hard to skip class to go check heifers," says ASA DNA Research Management and Youth Development Director Dr. Rachel Endecott.

Endecott is heavily involved with planning and grading all webinars and assignments, "I was simply blown away by the creativity and cleverness these juniors put into their assignments."

At the end of the contest, each animal's overall profitability is determined by subtracting the accrued costs by the final valuation. "This program was built to mimic what a real-world cattle feeder goes through," says Kemp, "You either made money or you didn't. Frankly, that is what your banker wants to know, too."

The contest takes into consideration the initial valuation, total costs accrued from delivery through harvest, final valuation based on total carcass price (base carcass price, and the premiums and discounts associated with carcass information). AJSA members have an opportunity to earn points toward the overall award at the AJSA National Classic if their SPC steer(s) are over 50% Simmental and place well in the contest. Depending on the number of SPC steers entered, the top ten or twenty individual steers receive awards at the AJSA National Classic awards banquet. The top five pens-of-three steers and the top monthly feedback in each age division also receive awards.

Ladyman says, "The first year we had ADG for the whole feeding period around 4.6 pounds per day. The second year they were around 4.2 pounds per day with some very poor feeding conditions in January and February — that well exceeds the national average of around 3.5 pounds per day."

Juniors who participate in SPC experience the nuances that the next owner of the calves go through first-hand, developing a more thorough understanding of how genetic value and good herd health impacts calves in the feedlot, ending with the animal hanging on the rail. Kemp concludes, "If we can help junior members become more engaged in this piece of the beef industry, not only do they learn more about cattle that excel in the feedlot, they are better positioned with knowledge, tools, and programs that fit their particular business — to potentially bolster their business and make them more profitable in the future."

New Performance Advocate Program Revisions ASA Performance

At the Fall Focus Board meetings in Manhattan, KS, the ASA Board approved a set of revisions to the Performance Advocate Program that take effect starting with the 2018 fall and 2019 spring THE enrollment cycles.



There are three big changes to the Performance Advocate Program summarized here . . .



- 1. Among the traits included, the Performance Advocate Program requires records submitted on 90% of the contemporary group.
 - Requiring/encouraging 100% of the records is not realistic and could tempt breeders to submit measurements of a lower standard than ideal. By setting the threshold to be 90% of the contemporary group or birth group, allows for missed weights or other understandable instances where records weren't collected yet still captures the bulk of the whole herd's data.
- 2. A two-tier system to qualify. Since additional traits are being added (see point 3) but some of these traits are difficult and/or expensive to collect, there will be a two-tier system for qualifying as a Performance Advocate. If THE herds submit 90% of the records on eight of the thirteen traits, they qualify for the

- first tier. THE herds with 90% of the records on ten out of the thirteen traits qualify for the higher tier system. If an existing performance advocate herd added two more traits to their qualifying records (example, mature cow weights and mature cow BCS) they would qualify as a performance
- 3. An additional seven traits have been added to the list of qualifying records in the program (see table).

advocate in the new system.

The list of important phenotypic and genomic data collected by breeders has grown extensively. The new Performance Advocate revisions can better acknowledge breeders focused on the growing list of economically important records. As ASA develops more traits (example, feet/leg scores), they may be added to the Performance Advocate Program.

The Performance Advocate Program has a long history of recognizing breeders who focus on quality data collection. The new revisions to the Performance Advocate Program sets the bar for continued high-quality data from breeders committed to genetic improvement. •

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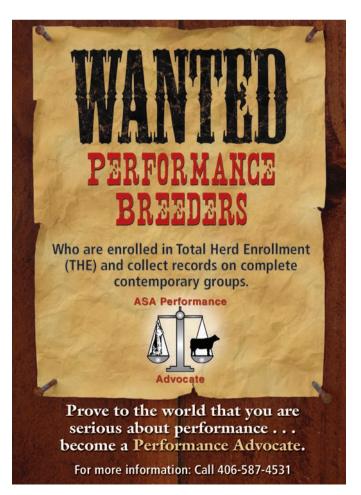

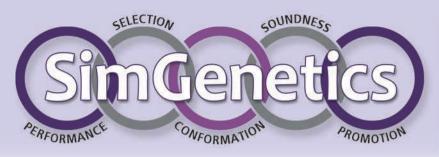

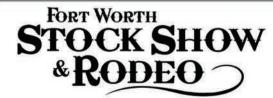

Women of ASA

Editor's Note: This is the eleventh article in a series highlighting significant contributions of women associated with SimGenetics.

As the North Dakota State Veterinarian and advocate for the beef industry, Dr. Susan Keller, Keller Broken Heart Ranch, Mandan, ND, is one of many influential women in the Simmental community.

Susan Keller, DVM

Born and raised in Kelly, Kansas, Susan Keller was widely exposed to ranch life as a child, milking dairy cows and working with their small beef herd. Keller's love for animals started as a young girl who preferred being outdoors, but grew as she started her first job in animal care at their local veterinary clinic.

"I came home from working at the vet clinic on my sixteenth birthday with a sick calf that had a colostomy. My family and friends had a surprise sixteenth birthday planned, but even then, all my friends knew that I was more into what was going on with the calf than my birthday."

Her passion for veterinary work propelled her into a career as a strong voice promoting animal health and agriculture as the North Dakota State Veterinarian.

During the summer between her junior and senior year at Kansas State University, Keller interned at a veterinary clinic in Mandan, ND, where she met her future husband, Dwight. Initially after veterinary school, she worked at a clinic in Bowman, ND, but soon transitioned to a clinic in Mandan closer to Dwight and the ranch. After their marriage in 1985, she opened a mobile, large animal practice, which eventually transitioned into a clinic on the ranch.

"One of the clients we had when I was interning in Mandan was the Keller family. Dwight was shy, but he eventually asked me out. The running joke at our wedding was that we never did quite cure all the dairy cows with Staphylococcus aureous that summer, so Dwight married me since he couldn't afford the vet bills," she laughed.

While raising her three children, Luke, Jake, and Tess, and simultaneously growing her veterinary business, Dr. Keller realized that she needed to either hire someone or she was not going to be spending any time with her family. "I was so busy trying to keep up with ranch and clinic work. I decided to fill out an application for a deputy state veterinary position because I knew I had to do something to balance being a mother and a veterinarian. I interviewed and surprisingly to me, ended up being offered the job."

After seven years as the deputy state veterinarian, Keller accepted the state veterinarian position where she works diligently with a great staff to handle state animal import permits, disease prevention and management, and welfare cases.

"I never thought I would work for the government, but I found out over the years that I am very passionate about animal health regulations. You don't realize the impact animal health regulations can have on animal health each day — locally, nationally, and globally."

Keller explains that communication and coordination behind the scenes is a large part of her job. She coordinates within ND and neighboring states to make sure the ND Board of Animal Health (BOAH) is aware and on top of any possible health concerns. If there is a health concern, the issue is dealt with as quickly as possible. Her office communicates directly with the BOAH, the Ag Commissioner, veterinarians and local producers.

"We are expected to keep up with what is going on around North Dakota in case we get a call inquiring about a particular animal health issue. The staff examines all the health certificates and archives each one in a searchable database. We are accountable for being able to determine if our state can retain our state free status for diseases. Disease traceability is the most critical part of what we do," she explained.

"Animal agriculture is all about feeding people. We have to educate ourselves in agriculture and need to be pleasantly assertive — whether it is a family get together, a public event, or something on social media, — to engage with people and educate people who are so unaware of what really goes on day-to-day on a farm or ranch. That is a lot of what I do as a state veterinarian."

After working full-days as the face of animal health in ND, Keller spends her evenings and weekends helping out on the family's Simmental and SimAngus™ seedstock cattle operation. Today, her kids are grown, and have taken over many responsibilities that Keller used to handle, but she continues to help, when time allows, where needed.

"I still enjoy sorting and working cattle. Sometimes, I end up with project cows. Right now, we have a cow that got bit by a rattlesnake. I spent many hours treating her wounds and wrapping one of her legs. I love projects with animals that have an injury or something that is a challenge, but has the potential to have a good outcome — it keeps me grounded as a veterinarian and engaged with our family operation."

Keller concludes, "Everyone has to eat. Food production and animal agriculture will always have a place in the world. There will always be a demand for protein, and we need to be good stewards so the public can look at what we are doing and feel good about buying beef. That is very important.

"We also need to all work together to spread the message

that there is no man-made model that will ever replace or compete with the most symbiotic and truly sustainable protein production system in the world! Think about it: a ruminant forages on lower quality proteins, in the form of grass or other feedstuffs, and converts it to a very high-quality protein which is a healthy food source for humans to enjoy eating and thrive on! God knew what he was doing when he created the bovine. I have been so fortunate to work with them throughout my lifetime."

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FROM THE HEADQUARTERS

Nearly a year and a half ago, on Saturday, May 5, 2018, the American Simmental Association released the first full suite of multi-breed EPDs powered by the state-of-the-art BOLT software. I have to admit that the ASA staff, with the exception of very few (maybe only Steve McGuire), was very scared as to what we would find in our email, voicemail, Face-

book Messenger, and so on come Monday morning. However, it wound up being so quiet, we all heard that mythical pin drop.

I'm not saying that we were perfect in our execution, but as you members started to evaluate the new EPDs, you had some well-deserved comments and questions that we were expecting.

We knew that the software wasn't "done". It never will be. In fact, I was still revising the 30-year-old Cornell software as recently as two short years ago. As with the old Cornell software, we will continue to update, revise, and improve the EPDs produced by the new BOLT software.

Check out what we have done so far:

June 2018

- Developed evaluation audit reports on incoming record counts for ASA staff and IGS partners
- Developed quality control (QC) reports for incoming genomic data
- Started clearing up erroneous and missing genotypes among all associations
- American Shorthorn Association released IGS EPDs

July 2018

- Started parallel (aka beta) testing for IGS partners yet to release IGS EPDs
- Started delivering weekly QC reports to each association through the genomic pipeline, which routes genomic data from all genomic labs to the IGS partners and then the IGS database

August 2018

- American Gelbvieh Association, North American Limousin Association, and Canadian Simmental Association released IGS EPDs
- Added embryo transfer data to the evaluation
- Discovered and corrected duplicate animal IDs
- Began collecting feed intake and heifer pregnancy data from IGS partners

September 2018

- Canadian Shorthorn Association released IGS EPDs
- Initiated monthly IGS partner conference calls to discuss issues and updates with the evaluation

October 2018

- Red Angus Association of America released IGS EPDs
- Developed a web-based interface for bull lookups and QC error checking for ASA staff and IGS partners
- Established a "white list" to keep animals with insignificant genomic discrepancies in the evaluation

 Adjusted the evaluation system to add genomic data on animals without carcass or ultrasound phenotypes

November 2018

- Implemented a Java script to compute breed composition of all animals in the IGS database at a much faster rate
- Began a research project with CSU to develop a days-to-finish EPD
- Initiated a project known as Work Order 1 (WO1) in order to:
 - Remove erroneous birth weights from the evaluation
 - Separate birth contemporary groups between calves out of two-year-old dams from calves out of older ones
 - Include heterogeneous variances for weaning weight based on sex of calf
 - Remove the moderately negative genetic correlation between weaning weight direct and maternal and set it to zero
 - Implement an updated marker subset of genomic data

December 2018

 Added trio (sire + dam + calf) mating checks to the QC error reports

January 2019

- Began investigating multi-breed imputation
- Started evaluating the latest version of the Flmpute software package

February 2019

- Began refining the Zoetis arm of the genomic pipeline
- Received preliminary results on the days- to-finish EPD research project
- Combined the heifer pregnancy (HPG) data from the IGS partners and began refining it

March 2019

- Started to investigate potential improvements to the carcass weight-ribeye area (CW-REA) evaluation
- Fixed minor bugs in the online bull lookup tool
- Added birth dates and other supplemental data to the HPG dataset
- Received the first set of health data courtesy of Darr Feedlot
- Upgraded the postgres evaluation database

April 2019

- Started exploring modifications to the utilization of external EPDs
- Tested several scenarios in the investigation to potentially improve the CW-REA evaluation
- Updated carcass breed differences with new data from USMARC
- Fixed a small bug in the docility evaluation scripts

May 2019

- Canadian Angus released IGS EPDs
- North American South Devon Association submitted external EPDs
- Began planning for the IGS partner meeting to be held October 23-24 in Bozeman
- Started building and developing server #5



June 2019

- Developed a standard format for sharing pedigree extracts among IGS partner associations in order to catch dualregistered animals more quickly
- Released data to Colorado State University (the leaders in PAP EPD development) for development of a PAP EPD

July 2019

- Implemented multi-breed imputation software
- Installed and configured Flmpute
- Implemented updates to the CW-REA evaluation

August 2019

- Added Australian Shorthorn Association data
- Added updated American Angus Association externals
- Re-calculated progeny equivalents for each trait computed by IGS

Spicing up your dinner table with tasty, beef-based dishes.

One-Pot Spinach Beef Soup Ingredients

- 1 pound ground beef
- 3 garlic cloves, minced
- 2 cartons (32 ounces each) reduced-sodium beef broth
- 2 cans $(14\frac{1}{2})$ ounces each) diced tomatoes with green pepper, celery and onion, undrained
- 1 teaspoon dried basil
- ½ teaspoon pepper
- ½ teaspoon dried oregano
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 3 cups uncooked bow tie pasta
- 4 cups fresh spinach, coarsely chopped
- Grated Parmesan cheese

Directions

In a 6-quart stockpot, cook ground beef in crumbles with garlic over medium heat until beef is no longer pink; drain. Stir in 64-ounces of beef broth, tomatoes and seasonings; bring to a boil. Stir in pasta; return to a boil. Cook, uncovered, until pasta is tender.

Stir in spinach until wilted. Sprinkle servings with Parmesan cheese. ◆

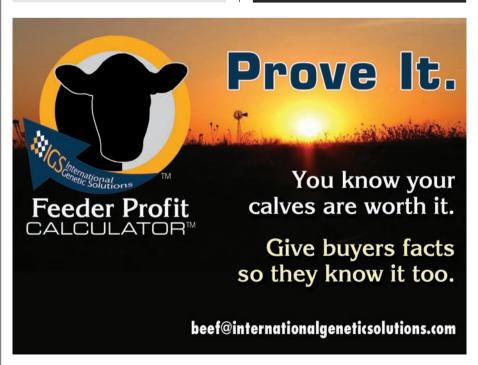

Percentage Simmental Policy Update

The ASA Board of Trustees recently passed a policy change updating percentage Simmental requirements for PTP shows. As of August 27, 2019, a percentage Simmental animal must be at least 1/2 Simmental but less than 7/8 Simmental starting March 1, 2020. Between now and March 1, it is up to the management for each PTP show to determine whether in the Percentage division the minimum is 3/8 or 1/2 Simmental. The

September issue of *the Register* magazine Ring of Champions ad (pg. 71), outlined the previous requirements as it had gone to print before the change. To qualify for the 2019-2020 Ring of Champions, animals must be at least 1/2 Simmental (see ad on page 31).

Performance Advocate Program Update

At the Fall Focus Board Meeting in Manhattan, KS, the board passed a resolution to revise the Performance Advocate Program including three major changes.

- 1. Among the traits included, the program requires record submission on 90% of the contemporary group (rather than 100%) to gather records on nearly the whole herd while allowing for circumstances where records are missed.
- 2. Establish a two-tier system to qualify. Since additional traits are being added (see point 3) but some of these traits are difficult and/or expensive to collect, there will be a two-tier system for qualifying as a Performance Advocate. If THE herds submit 90% of the records on eight of the thirteen traits, they qualify for the first tier. THE herds with 90% of the records on 10 out of the 13 traits qualify for the higher tier system.
- 3. An additional seven traits have been added to the list of qualifying records in the program (see page 28 for more details). As ASA develops more traits (example, feet/leg scores), they may be added he Performance Advocate Program.

ASF \$50 Reinstatement Fee

The ASA Board enacted an Annual Service Reinstatement Fee of \$50 for members who have not paid their Annual Service Fee (ASF). The current year's ASF was billed at the beginning of July, and if not paid prior to October 23, 2019, ASA will remove this billing from the member's account and the membership becomes inactive.

If a member wishes to become active later in the same fiscal year, a reinstatement fee will apply. This fee consists of the regular annual service fee plus the \$50 reinstatement fee. If you have questions, please contact the Association at 406-587-4531 or simmental@simmgene.com.



Cow Herd DNA Roundup Continues

The ASA Board of Trustees approved Phase II of the Cow Herd DNA Roundup at the 2019 Fall Focus meeting. The project will continue to accept new herds at \$25 per sample for a low-density genomic test. Members must test 90% of their calving-age cows to qualify for the reduced price.

When members submit mature cow body weights and body condition scores or hip heights from 90% of their calving-age cows, they will receive a \$5 credit to their account for each cow reported. Cows must be 18 months of age or older when mature cow measurements are taken to qualify for the \$5 credit. The \$5 credit will only be applied once in an animal's life (if a member received a credit for the phenotypes in 2018 for that cow, they cannot receive another credit for the same cow with a new weight and BCS in 2019). Heifers may also be tested at the \$25 price point and may receive a \$5 credit if mature cow data is submitted after they reach 18 months of age. For members who have already participated in the CHR project, the same \$25 rate is available for heifers and new purchases as long as 90% of the member's calving age cows have a genomic test.

Genetic Conditions Panel

The Genetic Conditions Panel includes seven genetic defects tracked by the American Simmental Association. These defects are: AM, NH, CA, DD, OS, PHA, and TH.

The Genetic Conditions Panel is available with GGP-LD or GGP-HD testing, and the add-on price for the panel is \$25. If a member orders any one of the genetic conditions on the panel with a GGP-LD or GGP-HD test, the entire panel will automatically be tested. If the animal is not undergoing a GGP-LD or GGP-HD test, the price is \$25 per defect tested. If requesting the genetic conditions panel after a GGP-LD or GGP-HD test is complete, the testing will be billed at single defect rates, which is \$25 per defect.

Consumer Reports Rates Food Labels

Consumer Reports (CR) has announced it has evaluated a broad range of food label seals and has created a "CR Rating" to help consumers determine which ones are meaningful. Surveys that CR conducted in 2018 and 2019 show that consumers are confused about food labels such as "natural," "organic," and "no antibiotics."

In many cases, there is a disconnect between what a claim actually offers and what many believe it should offer. The studies also found that meanings behind label claims and seals can vary widely and not all of them are verified. According to CR, "no one is checking to ensure a company is complying with standards set by the government or certifying organization."

3D Printed Steaks

Spanish Startup Novameat has acquired a seed-money round of funding to help the company expand development of 3Dprinted plant-based foods. Novameat first gained notoriety last year when it claimed the world's first successful production of 3D printed plant-based steaks.

The new investment capital from food tech investment firm New Crop Capital will help expand the company's efforts.

Missouri Judge Lets Bill Take Effect

A Missouri Judge has lifted a restraining order that temporarily halted a new law limiting county-level control of large livestock operations known as concentrated animal feeding operations (CAFOs).

The move by a Cole County judge lets Senate Bill 391 take effect across the state of Missouri. The law bars local governments from drawing new rules for CAFOs that are stricter than those imposed by the state. Several county-level government bodies and farmers sued the state, arguing the law violates Missouri's "Right to Farm" law and seeking to protect local control.

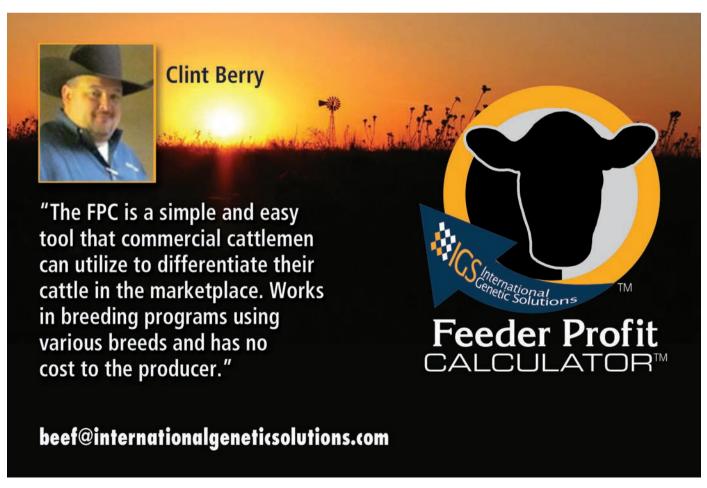
FDA Extends Comment Period

The US Food and Drug Administration (FDA) has announced it will extend the comment period for public input on transit times to slaughter facilities, milking frequency and interpretation of zero-day withdrawal periods and zero-day milk discard times for animal drugs.

The comment period now will close on January 6, 2020. FDA hasn't changed policies with regard to transit times and withdrawal periods since the 1980s, and is looking to update them in a way that reflects current industry practices.

USDA to Investigate Beef Markets

The US Department of Agriculture (USDA) will launch an investigation into recent beef pricing margins to determine if there is any evidence of price manipulation, collusion, restrictions of competition or unfair practices in the markets in the wake of the devastating fire at Tyson Foods' Holcombe, KS, plant.





The fire knocked out an estimated 5% of total cattle processing capacity, and 15% to 25% of Tyson's overall capacity, rattling the markets. Prices rose in the week after the fire, then dropped for fed cattle ready for slaughter.

Scope of Dietary Guidelines Limited

The Trump administration is limiting the scope that the dietary guidelines advisory committee will consider for the 2020 guidelines.

The approach is a shift from five years ago when the committee was under fire for taking too broad of an approach, which included climate change considerations. Past committee work was also criticized for not taking into account research that shows the nutritional value of meat.

Federal Court Says WOTUS Unlawful

A federal court in Georgia has ruled that the Environmental Protection Agency's 2015 Waters of the United States (WOTUS) rule is unlawful under the Clean Water Act (CWA) because of its "vast expansion of jurisdiction over waters and land traditionally with the states' regulatory authority."

The US District Court for the Southern District of Georgia said the agency also overstepped the Administrative Procedure Act, which outlines basic rules governing how agencies may propose and establish federal regulations.

RFID to Replace Metal Bangs Tags

Over the next four years, USDA will stop providing free metal tags as part of the brucellosis eradication program and will require bison and cattle producers to purchase RFID tags for breeding animals moving across state lines. Initially, USDA and states may subsidize the new tags, but producers will eventually foot the bill.

The following types of beef cattle and bison must be tagged for interstate commerce: sexually intact and 18 months or older used for rodeo or recreational events (regardless of age) or used for shows or exhibitions.

Millenials Willing to Pay More

Quality drives millennial food shopping, and they are willing to pay more for it. According to a new survey, 80% of millenials value quality when it comes to food shopping, and nearly 70% are willing to spend more money on high-quality foods.

A majority of millenials want to know where their food comes from and how it is sourced. Transparency in food sourcing is important to more than 65% of those surveyed, particularly for fresh meat and seafood. More than half of millennials will pay more for products that have adopted animal welfare standards and prefer to buy those responsibly sourced.

Millenials Think Outside the Box

Among the unique properties for beef sales of that generation called millennials is their interest in new and not-the-usual cuts of beef. Demand is growing for cuts that offer both taste and visual appeal.

For example, millenials have gravitated toward cuts that have the bone in them. For processors and butchers, shifting priorities are changing how beef is cut and merchandised.

Meat Industry Hall of Fame Honors Six

The Meat Industry Hall of Fame has named six new members: Burger Smokehouse second generation owner, Morris Burger; meat science professor at the University of Nebraska, Chris Calkins; Texas A&M meat science professor, Kerri B. Gehring; John Harris from Harris Farms Branded Beef; President and CEO of Agri Beef, Robert Rebholtz, ConAgra Refrigerated Prepared Foods, R. Bruce Tompkin.

Packing Owner Guilty of Falsifying *E. coli* Tests

The owner and general manager of New England Meat Packing, LLC, located in Stafford Springs, pleaded guilty to a charge related to his meat processing business's falsification of numerous E. coli test results. The company is required to perform one generic *E. coli* carcass swab for every 300 animals slaughtered and to periodically collect ground beef samples for *E. coli* testing.

Between November 3, 2016 and September 9, 2017, a total of 36 documents were submitted relating to 52 separate carcass swabs and ground beef samples. The documents stated that the *E. coli* testing was conducted, and all 52 samples tested negative for *E. coli*. No carcass swabs and samples were submitted or tested, and the 36 documents were fraudulently prepared using laboratory letterhead from previous testing the company conducted with the laboratory.

Two Arrested For Relabeling "Choice" Beef as "Prime"

The former co-owners of a Brooklynbased meat processing business were arrested and charged this week with conspiring to commit wire fraud for allegedly using counterfeit USDA stamps to misbrand "Choice" grade beef as higherquality "Prime" and inflate the price.

The US Attorney's Office for the Eastern District of New York accused the owners of directing employees of A. Stein Meat Products Inc., a wholesale meat processing and distribution company, to carve off the "Choice" markings and restamp the meat as "Prime." The meat was sold at inflated prices to customers in the New York City metropolitan area, according to the indictment.

Bulls Killed in Oregon

Five mutilated, dead bulls with missing body parts were discovered in Malheur National Forest, Burns, OR, and on the Silvies Valley Ranch, Seneca, OR. Determining the cause of death was not possible because the bulls were found past the 24-hour window when a veterinary inspection would have been effective.

The missing body parts don't appear to have been chewed, but the wounds appeared clean-cut, and appear to have been cut out with a sharp blade. There were no signs of predatory eating or chewing. The Oregon Cattlemen's Association has offered a reward of up to \$1,000 to anyone who can provide information leading to the arrest and conviction of whoever is responsible. A separate \$25,000 reward is also being offered by an anonymous party.

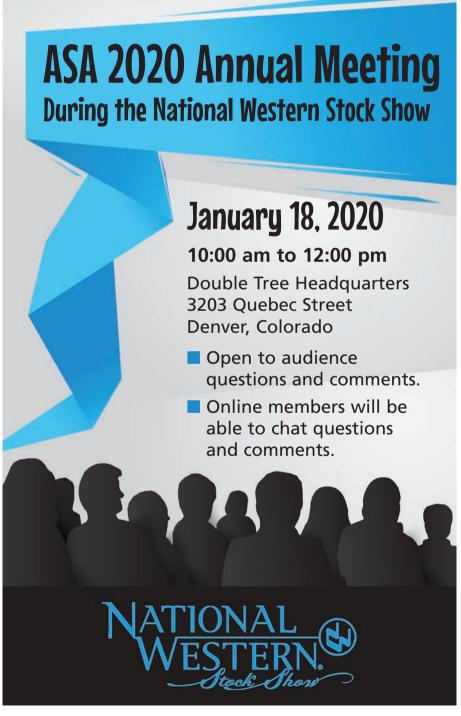

Researchers Identify Promising New Gene Markers

Feed efficiency improvements through genetic selection could significantly reduce production costs and benefit sustainability of beef production. Scientists at the University of Alberta have identified 19 genes that could serve as key markers for feed efficiency in cattle.

The Alberta researchers examined genome-wide gene expression of rumen, liver, muscle and back fat tissues — key tissues involved in energy metabolism. Of about 20,000 genes expressed in those tissues, the researchers identified 19 genes that are common to all four tissues and appear to be associated with feed efficiency. "The 19 overlapped genes identified from the strongest module–trait relationships in four tissues are potential generic gene markers for feed efficiency," the researchers say.



Bison Meat *E. Coli* Outbreak Over

The Center for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) has declared an outbreak of two strains of *E. Coli* stemming from bison meat that caused 33 illnesses in eight states, has ended.

The CDC said the *E. coli* outbreak "appears to be over" and stressed that restaurants, retailers and institutions should not sell or serve the recalled ground bison, which was produced between February 22 and April 30 of this year.

Genomic Study Suggests why E. Coli Survive

Research led by Kyushu University in Japan has found that *E. coli* from cattle share widespread genetic similarities with *E. coli* that cause food poisoning in humans. According to researchers, this finding suggests that the pathogenic traits harmful to humans may be the same traits that allow *E. coli* to survive and adapt in the bovine intestine.

The researchers found that most of the strains causing intestinal problems in humans belonged to the group associated with cattle. While they generally don't cause illness in cattle, their prevalence in the investigated samples suggested that *E. coli* may be able to protect itself from bacteria-eating organisms present in cattle intestines. The research concluded that more work is needed to identify the exact reason.

Tool May Speed-up Bovine TB Detection

A new tuberculosis (TB) screening tool developed by researchers at Iowa State University and the US Department of Agriculture (USDA) can dramatically reduce the time to detect strains of Mycobacterium bovis, the bacteria that causes bovine tuberculosis (TB), a serious livestock disease that affects the health of millions of animals and people worldwide.

The new tool collects extremely low levels of volatile organic compounds emitted by the bacteria, making it possible to differentiate between disease-causing and non-disease-causing strains. The device can be used to collect and analyze samples within hours — much more quickly than current methods, which often take up to eight weeks, the university said in an announcement.

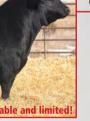

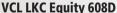

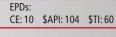

Cargill Launches Animal, Human Health Unit

Cargill has announced "a transformation" in its Animal Nutrition enterprise to make it "more customer-centric and capture greater opportunity for growth in a more costcompetitive way." The company said it is specifically adding "health" to the name of the division to become Cargill Animal Nutrition & Health "because of the importance it plays in our customers' and consumers' expectations.

The company's animal nutrition and health division will now be comprised of three units: Cargill Animal Nutrition, Cargill Aqua Nutrition and a new Cargill Health Technologies. The current Cargill Premix & Nutrition and Cargill Feed & Nutrition business groups will be combined into a single business group called Cargill Animal Nutrition (CAN).



Baby Food Brand Adds Bison

The Serenity Kids baby food brand has announced two new varieties, Grass Fed Bison and Pasture Raised Turkey. and an expansion of its retail distribution. Launched a year ago, the brand is now in more than 1,000 stores and is available online.

The high-fat, low-sugar baby food blends offer "unique savory flavor profiles and nutrition infants need from ethically raised meats and organic vegetables" according to the company's recent press release.

Restaurant Giant Scoops Up Jimmy John's

Inspire Brands announced it has entered into an agreement to acquire Jimmy John's Sandwiches; financial terms were not disclosed. At the close of the transaction, James North will serve as president of the Jimmy John's brand, reporting to Co-Founder and Chief Executive Officer of Inspire Brands Paul Brown. Jimmy John Liautaud will step down as chairman and transition to an advisor to the brand.

Jimmy John's was founded in 1983 and includes more than 2,800 locations across 43 states. Inspire Brands is owned by Roark Capital Group. Arby's Restaurant Group was renamed Inspire Brands as the company took ownership of Buffalo Wild Wings and Sonic in 2018.

Koch Foods Files Suit

Koch Foods has filed a complaint in US District Court in Mississippi accusing the federal government of illegally searching its chicken processing plant in Morton, for undocumenting immigrants during raids last month on seven plants owned by five companies.

Koch Foods is asking that the government not be allowed to use the information seized during the search of its plant. It asks the court to order the return of the property to the company. US Immigration and Customs (ICE) agents detained 680 people in the raids. ◆









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INTERNATIONAL

Access to Japanese Beef Opened

The US has agreed to expand its low-tariff quota for Japanese beef. Specifics on the amount of the increase beyond the current 200 tons per year were not known, but it will be taxed at far below the 26.4% rate on quota-exceeding exports, according to the report.

Japan shipped 421 tons of beef worth US \$31 million to the US last year, quadrupling growth in five years according to the Times. In exchange, Japan will lift tariffs on the US wine seven years after a trade deal takes effect.



Finland Wants to Ban Brazilian Beef

Finland urged the European Union (EU) to consider banning Brazillian beef as a penalty for the Amazon rainforest fires. Brazil's National Institute for Space Research found the country lost more than 1,330 square miles of forest cover to development since January, a 39% increase over the same period in 2018.

Some media outlets have been overt in blaming meat production for the devastation. CNN, for example, ran a headline saying, "The Amazon is burning because the world eats so much meat." The Japan Times went further with the headline "Global appetite for beef and soy fuels Amazon fires."

China Buys Meat from 25 Brazilian Plants

China has authorized meat exports from 25 Brazilian processing plants. The list of approved plants include 17 beef processing facilities, six poultry units, and one pork unit. Brazil now has 89 meat processing plants authorized to sell meat to China

Local meat processors were already expecting China to expand the number of Brazilian plants authorized to export to the country, amid the increased demand related to the outbreak of African Swine Fever.

Canadian Meat Industry Urges Action

The cost of the suspension of Canadian pork and beef exports to China imposed on June 25 has approached \$100 million and poses a risk to jobs the longer it continues.

The temporary ban on Canadian exports was triggered by China Customs discovering a shipment of non-Canadian pork exhibiting technical irregularities and fraudulently certified as Candian with falsified document. The Canadian Food Inspection Agency (CFIA) has provided China Customs with all the information and analysis to demonstrate the source of the infractions was not Canadian, the meat group said.



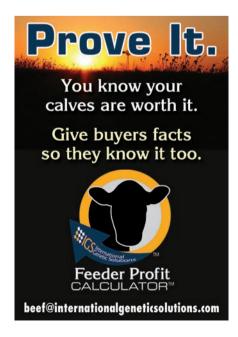
Growing Chinese Demand Leads Beef Trade

In the last few years, China has replaced the US as the leading beef importer. Total world beef imports increased by 17.7% in the five years since 2015 to 2019. Over that same period, beef imports in China increased 153.4% along with 62.2% increase in beef imports into Hong Kong leading to a 122.6% increase in beef imports in China/Hong Kong region. By contrast total beef imports into the US decreased by an estimated 12.3% over that period.

Australia Beef Brand Expands to US

Australia-based Cleaver's Organic has expanded operations to include the United States, offering meats marketed as humanely raised by sustainable family farms, achieving 100% carbon neutral status.

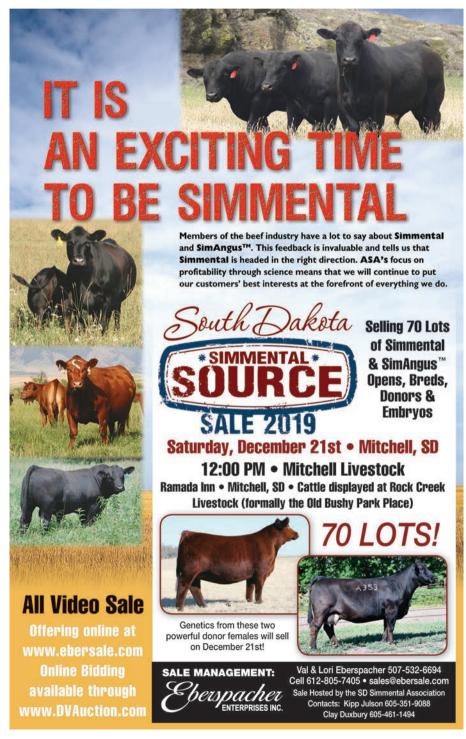
Cleaver's achieves 100% carbon neutral status by compensating for all carbon emissions with activities that absorb the same amount or more of carbon. These activities are called carbon offsets. A carbon offset represents one ton of carbon dioxide-equivalent greenhouse gas that has been prevented from entering the atmosphere. A third party reduces greenhouse gases on the company's behalf through a Carbon Offset Project offsets emissions.



Making Meat in Space

Aleph Farms of Israel has announced that by using 3D bioprinting technology the company took a step toward producing meat on the International Space Station.

Their production method of cultivating beef relies on mimicking a natural process of muscle-tissue regeneration occurring inside the cow's body, but under controlled conditions. Within the framework of this experiment, a successful proof of concept was established by assembling a small-scale muscle tissue in a 3D bioprinter under microgravity conditions. •

Spring 2020 THE enrollment is OPEN

By ASA's Total Herd Enrollment Department

Any females of calving age that will calve between January 1 and June 30, 2020, will need to be enrolled by December 15, 2019 to take advantage of the lowest enrollment fees.

ALL members previously enrolled in 2019, Spring Total Herd Enrollment (THE) MUST submit an inventory even if there aren't any changes/updates to enrolled females. If you submit an enrollment today, you will be able to adjust your inventory online through Herdbook Services up until the deadline of December 15. There's absolutely no reason not to go ahead, fill out an inventory today, and submit it well before the deadline.

Below is a checklist to make sure your enrollment goes smoothly. If you want more information on how to get started on your enrollment, go to pages 17 and 18.

Our motto is: Don't Delay, Enroll Today!

Spring THE Checklist

A spring calver is any female due to calve January 1 – June 30, 2020.

- ✓ Have you read through the most up-to-date instructions and enrollment/removal codes on simmental.org?
- ✓ Does each cow listed on your preliminary inventory have an enrollment code or a removal code?
- ✓ Are there any cows missing from this list? If so, add them by registration number. If they are commercial cows, provide their tattoo, date of birth, and breed codes.
- ✓ Did you remove all cows from the enrollment that are no longer in your herd? When you remove a cow from the herd (placing a code 60-82 in the primary code field), make sure you place an "N" in the "A/B/C/D/N" field. The "N" stands for not enrolling.
- ✓ Are you enrolling females that are not under your membership? (partnership or junior cows), add them by registration numbers not tattoos.
- ✓ Are all purchased females added to the enrollment at the bottom of the form? Any missed females may accidentally incur a late-fee and re-enrollment fee. If you purchased a cow after the THE enrollment deadline and will be calving the same season, email the THE department with her ASA number, your member number, and the season/year the female needs enrolled.
- ✓ Have you provided the proper enrollment code for all donor and recipient females that are managed in your herd? If you don't manage the female within your herd, you do not have to place them on your inventory.
- ✓ Do you have all your calf data submitted prior to 2019 spring? If not, you'll have to submit this data prior to submitting or mailing in your spring 2020 dam enrollment. Keep in mind that you can submit the 2019 spring calf data with or after submitting your current enrollment.
